DID YOU KNOW ?????

Fifty-four percent of women who have abortions had used a contraceptive method (usually the condom or the pill) during the month they became pregnant. Among those women, 76% of pills users and 49% of condom users report having used their method inconsistently, while 13% of pill users and 14% of condom users report correct use. [8]

Forty-six percent women who have abortions had not used a contraceptive method during the month they became pregnant. Of these women, 33% had perceived themselves to be at low risk for pregnancy, 32% had had concerns about contraceptive methods, 26% had had unexpected sex and 1% had been forced to have sex.

About half of unintended pregnancies occur among the 11% of women who are at risk for unintended pregnancy but are not using contraceptives. Most of these women have practiced contraception in the past.

Purity: Reverence for Mystery

The two words most often abused today are "freedom" and "sex." Freedom is often used to mean absence of law, and sex is used to justify absence from restraint. Sometimes the two words fuse into the one, "license," Reason, which should be used to justify God's law, is thus invoked to justify human lawlessness and carnality with two spurious arguments. The first is that every person must be self-expressive, that purity is self-negation; therefore, it is destructive of freedom and personality. The second argument is that nature has given to every person certain impulses and instincts, and that principal among them is sex. Therefore, one ought to follow these instincts without the taboos and restrictions which religion and custom impose. Consequently, purity is looked upon as negative and cold, or as a remnant of Puritanism, monasticism, and Victorian strait-lacedness, despite the fact that the Lord of the Universe in the first of the Beatitudes said: "Blessed are the clean of heart; they shall see God." (Matt. 5:8)

> Purity is as self-expressive as impurity, though in a different way. There are two ways in which a

locomotive can be self-expressive: either by keeping its pressure within the limits imposed by the designer and the engineer, or by blowing up and jumping the tracks. The first self-expression is the perfection of the locomotive; the second is its destruction. In like manner, a person may be self-expressive either by obeying the laws of his nature, or by rebelling against them, which rebellion ends in slavery and frustration. Suppose the same argument of self-expression were used in war as is used to justify carnal license. In that case, a soldier at the front who, on hearing screaming shells, dropped his gun and ran to the rear line, would be greeted by a captain full of modern self-expression and told: "I commend you for throwing off Victorian convention and moral scruples. The trouble with the rest of the army is that they are not self-expressive; they overcome their fear and fight. I shall recommend a medal of honor for asserting your personality."

There is no quarreling with those who say, "Be yourself." The point is, which is your true self: is it to be a beast, or to be a child of God? Those who get over the wickedness of licentiousness say: "Thank God, I am myself again." This is real self-expression.

About the Author: Venerable Fulton J. Sheen

Fulton John Sheen was born to Newton and Delia on May 8, 1895 in El Paso, Illinois. The oldest of four sons, he was baptized Peter John in St. Mary's Church, but soon became known by his mother's maiden name, Fulton. The family moved to Peoria where the young Sheen attended school and served as an altar boy at St. Mary's Cathedral. Turning down a significant scholarship for graduate school, he followed his desire to become a priest and entered St. Paul's Seminary in Minnesota.



He was ordained a priest on September 20, 1919 in the Peoria Cathedral. Father Sheen went on to become Archbishop Fulton John Sheen, a universally popular evangelist, radio/ TV personality, writer and missionary. He is most known for his television series, "Life is Worth Living" which had a viewing audience of over 30 million people.

On October 3, 1979 Archbishop Sheen had an audience with Pope John Paul II at which the Pope embraced Sheen and gave a perfect summary of his life and work: "You have written and spoken well of the Lord Jesus. You have been a loyal son of the Church!" Archbishop Fulton John Sheen, a Son of Peoria, a Son of the Church, died on December 9, 1979 in his private chapel in his Manhattan apartment. In 2002, Bishop Daniel Jenky, CSC, of the Diocese of Peoria, IL officially opened the cause for Sheen's beatification and canonization.



SNAPSHOT: Luigi & Maria Beltrame Quattrocchi

Luigi and Maria Beltrame Quattrocchi were the first couple to be beatified *together*, an honor that was also recently bestowed on the parents of St. Therese of Lisieux (see Vol. 4, No. 3).

Before they met each other both Maria and Luigi were already committed social activists and reformers who pursued higher education and were involved in Catholic lay groups. Luigi studied law and became a lawyer and public administrator. Maria, who grew up in the great cultural treasure

house of Florence, became a professor and public speaker in education and had a particular interest in music and art.

They both considered their real vocations began when they found each other. Their family home in Via Depretisin Rome became the centre of deepening faith, their social apostolate and charity work. Maria's last pregnancy with Enrichetta, was a life-threatening one. Her doctors pressured her to have an abortion to save her life. Maria and Luigi refused and dedicated their child to God in a vigil of prayer. Both mother and baby survived. The Beltrame family had a lively and happy family life; people often joined them on camping and hiking holidays near their holiday house in the hills.

During the Second World War, the Beltrame home became an accommodation centre for refugees and the dislocated: a drop-in centre for anyone in need. People were given support, food and a place to stay and were invited to join the family's regular Rosary, Holy Hours and other prayers.

In addition, both Luigi and Maria assisted in establishing programs of Catholic adult education, catechesis, marriage prepa-

ration, and retreats. Together, they founded a scout group for disadvantaged boys. The couple had an intense prayer life and both in different ways contributed to the reconstruction of Italy after the devastation of the Second World War. Luigi became the deputy attorney general for Italy, Maria assisted in the foundation of the Sacred Heart Catholic University in Rome. Luigi died in the well-loved family home in Rome in 1951, Maria died at 81 being held by the daughter she had refused to abort.
